

The church building was erected in 1824 by the burgh (city) of Edinburgh during the building of the New Town. It is a distinctive architectural landmark on the city skyline. And it is home to a faithful and creative worshipping community, while also serving as the parish church for people of all faiths and no faith.

Our facilities are open 7 days a week, offering a welcoming space to a number of community groups, organisations and faith-based initiatives. We welcome enquiries to hire the use of the facilities but regret that we can only accept bookings for activities allowed under current government guidelines. Contact us for further information. As a welcoming church, Broughton St Mary's offers a supportive space for the full participation of LGBT people in the life of the church.

Letter from Laurene

As we move into autumn, it is a gentle reminder of change. With the crisp evening air and shortening of days, nature signals this change. We move from the joy of summer, the accompanying ease and holidays to the excitement of back to school, reconnecting with friends and daily routines.

There is a rhythm of change in our lives. Often, it is transformational and enables us to grow in unexpected ways in our faith and outlook of life. Yet, it does seem like we experienced a lifetime of changes in such a relatively short time. The memory of a pre-covid life seems ages ago, perhaps because of all that has transpired in our own personal, congregational and national settings during these roughly two and half years. During the second lockdown when I hit a particular rough patch, I had a profound sense of solace and inspiration after recalling that God created life out of chaos. In the midst of all the change and chaos, God is creating new life in and all around us.

Against this backdrop of intense change, we now have a new UK government, new monarch, and of course, an emerging new configuration of our national and local churches. The Presbytery Planning process is currently taking place in the thirty-nine presbyteries within the Church of Scotland. It is this change I would like to focus upon.

As you know, since mid February we have been discussing and listening to one another about the potential union of Broughton St. Mary's, Greenside and St. Andrews & St George's West. We have also been getting to know our brothers and sisters of both congregations through shared worship services and fellowship gatherings. It is all quite positive as we move toward union together.

Although, recently, this vision and the timing of this plan has needed to be adjusted. Rev. Rosie Magee announced that she was demitting her charge to St. Andrew's & St. George's West Church on 31 October. Because of this pending vacancy, "it is proposed that Broughton St. Mary's and Greenside enter into a Union as part of a Parish Grouping including St. Andrew's & St. George's West Church. Once the position of STAGW, shortly to be in vacancy, is clearer, a wider Union of the three churches may progress."

So what this means is that the three congregations will continue to work together, sharing worship together when appropriate, e.g. Holy Week, and developing a sense of community through fellowship opportunities. We will enter into a Union with Greenside, probably early next spring, worshipping at BStM.

Meanwhile, various configurations of our church leadership will begin meeting. We will explore how we bring our two congregations together so that all people are included. Suzie (*Rev Suzie Stark, locum minister at Greenside*) and I will exchange pulpits on 16 October, Greenside will join us for worship on the 20 November and pursue a time schedule of shared worship.

We had a good Session meeting last Wednesday when we discussed this new proposal. I can share there was positive support for moving forward.

These are exciting and of course, anxious times. The good news is that the spirit of God is leading as we seek to listen, learn and move forward into the new thing that God is doing. Look forward to many future discussions about the changes in our lives, and how God's spirit is manifesting goodness and peace.

One of our own members, Adam Bruce, was involved in the state ceremonies that took place following the death of Queen Elizabeth. Adam was appointed Marchmont Herald in 2012, and eagle-eyed members would have seen him in his heraldic garb at many of the ceremonial events.

Mark Woods, Editor of the Bible Society said:

"Our Queen's faith in Jesus Christ was central to her life... In her 2000 broadcast she told the watching millions: 'To many of us, our beliefs are of fundamental importance. For me, the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life. I, like so many of you, have drawn great comfort in difficult times from Christ's words and example."
